

Agnes Ravatn's novels have earned international and national acclaim. The Bird Tribunal won the English PEN Translation Award and several major Norwegian prizes, and was shortlisted for the Dublin Literary Award and the Petrona Award. Her later novels, The Seven Doors and The Guests, have also received significant recognition, including the Norwegian Bookseller's Award and a longlisting for the CWA International Dagger.

Summoned to a remote island for a family strategy meeting, the stage is set for more than a leadership decision. At the heart of the struggle stands Edda – editor, Filip's wife, and keeper of secrets that could shatter everything. When a manuscript emerges that threatens to expose the family's hidden past, loyalties are tested and long-suppressed tensions erupt.

Doggerland is an intense, finely tuned chamber drama exploring the fault lines between truth and lies, art and commerce, inheritance and survival. With her signature precision and psychological insight, Agnes Ravatn delivers a novel that feels both timeless and urgent – a story about what is lost, what is inherited, and what it takes to protect both literature and oneself.

Her breakthrough novel The *Bird Tribunal* (2013) became an international bestseller, sold to 21 countries, and was later adapted into a successful stage play. She has since written the acclaimed novels *The Seven Doors* (2019) and *The Guests* (2022), works that confirm her position as one of the most compelling voices in contemporary Nordic literature.



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
