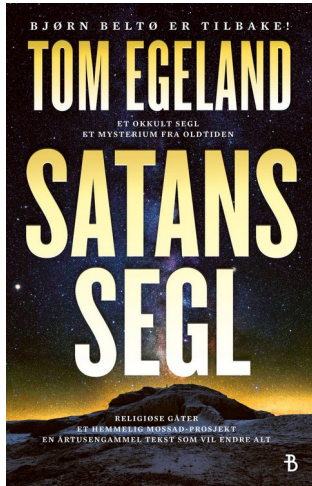


Tom Egeland

In *Satan's Seal*, Tom Egeland returns to the blend of archaeology, religion, history, and suspense that has made the Bjørn Beltø novels an international phenomenon. Perfect for readers of Dan Brown and Ken Follett!

In 1990, Israeli archaeologist Benjamin Stern disappears during the excavation of a burial chamber in the desert. More than thirty years later, Stern's daughter unexpectedly receives a postcard from her father. Could he still be alive? Desperate for answers, she turns to Bjørn Beltø, Norway's renowned archaeologist and reluctant hero.

As Beltø follows the trail into the Middle East, he uncovers a top-secret Mossad project dedicated to prevent anyone from uncovering the truth behind some of the greatest mysteries of the Old Testament. Hidden within classified archives and forbidden research may be scientific explanations for the Biblical Flood, the Ten Plagues of Egypt, and the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah.
